Raising awareness of Fraud by Amy Padden, CFE

Fraud is the biggest growing crime in the UK and is still majorly unreported. There are various ways of committing fraud, from very simple methods to long and elaborate ways. One of the most common ways of committing fraud is called phishing. This is when a fraudster aims to get your personal information from you without you knowing. A common way fraudsters do this is by creating fake websites that look like the genuine site they are impersonating. The website address can look like it's a genuine site, although subtle changes are in there. Examples include changing letters to number e.g. google.com and g00gle.com (the first being genuine, the second being fake), or amending letters to look like other letters e.g. using 2 "n"'s to look like a "m" or a capital "I" to look like a lower case "l". e.g. amazon.co.uk and annazon.co.uk or visitlondon.com and visitlondon.com. Fraudsters will pay companies like Google to 'sponsor' these websites so that they appear at the top of a search feed making them appear more genuine. When you are on the fraudulent website, the fraudster will be able to see all the information you are entering.

There is a lot of stigma attached to being a victim of fraud, so many victims don't share their story for fear of being ridiculed. By reporting it to the police, it can help build up a picture to understand if wider fraud rings are in action. Although you may feel embarrassed by becoming a victim of fraud, sharing your story could help prevent someone else become a victim.

We, along with a number of other brave souls doing similar around the country, continue with this annual challenge safe in the knowledge that monies raised will begin to help these men and women who have put their all on the line in the name of Queen or King and Country yet are so badly let down by the system when they need it most!

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Parish Council News

For detailed information relating to Parish Council matters, please visit chedzoyparishcouncil.gov.uk where there is a wealth of information. The Parish Council is in the process of updating its website to make it more user friendly and to provide more information.

Concern has been expressed about the flooding in Ward Lane and the apparent lack of action from Somerset Council. Councillors are also worried in case the "improvement works" to the King Sedgemoor Drain between Parchey and the Sluice gate has meant that the local water table might have risen. Which, in turn would mean an increase in flooding problems.

Correspondence from Somerset Council said they would no longer supply sandbags for flood prevention purposes.

The Highways Department were again to be contacted to see what was happening to bring the speed limit signage up to standard so that our Village Speedwatch could become operational.

Rector's Ramblings for Eastertide Well, Easter has come upon us very quickly, hasn't it? In Western Christianity Easter can happen as early as 22nd March and as late as 25th April. This makes it what is called a 'moveable feast' in the church calendar.

The season of Lent begins 6 weeks before Easter and it is a time to take stock of our lives and our spirituality and see if there is anything about those things we can change, that would make us feel more fulfilled.

The year so far has flown by and both our churches have been busy. At Chedzoy we have been trying out a different pattern of services to enable us to cater for more of our community. If you have any ideas for 'church' then do let us know.

We continue to have a gentle stream of baptisms and recently had a Marriage Thanksgiving service which was great fun.

Speaking of thanksgiving, I am so thankful for our community in Chedzoy. I know I've said this before, but the village is full of people who do so much for the church regardless of their personal faith. This is so much appreciated. So, a huge 'thank you' from me for all the whist drives, race nights, car boot sales, Lent lunches and other events that so generously help our church

There is so much kindness in the village and people do such a lot for each other. That is a sign of love for our neighbours and all love we share is a reflection of God's love which comes to us in our Lord Jesus. God's love is pure and unbounded. He loves each and every one of us equally – whoever we are and whatever we do. There is nothing between us when it comes to God's love. One friend heard me say these things and said, 'I am so glad you believe that Jane, it is a lovely thought but I'm not sure how that would work!'

It works simply because we believe that what God promises is true.

So, now have a very Happy Easter and may you meet the post-resurrection Jesus on your faith journey and allow him to walk with you, as he did with the disciples on the Road to Emmaus.

I shall close with an Easter blessing for you all:

God the Father, by whose glory Christ was raised from the dead, strengthen you to walk with him in his risen life; and the blessing of God Almighty, the Father, the Son and The Holy Spirit be amongst you and remain with you and those whom you love and pray for, always. Amen

My first memories of Chedzoy by Francis Hunt

In 1962, I had left school and joined Bridgwater Young Farmers Club. In the autumn of that year the club were building a Carnival Cart at Fishers Farm, Chedzoy.

My friend Mark having just passed his motor cycle test and could take a passenger, suggested we took a ride out to Chedzoy to help with the Carnival cart, so off we went!

On arriving at Fishers Farm nobody else had arrived and after an hour of waiting we decided to go home. On departing from the barn, we spotted a carrier bag full of empty beer bottles which were worth one penny each on deposit.

We soon found ourselves at the off licence window at The Manor where we traded them for two full bottles! Off we went home happily but unbeknown to me at the time, this is where a young schoolgirl lived. Seven years later she became my girlfriend, and we were married in 1971 at Chedzoy Church. When I arrived at Fishers Farm in 1962 I didn't realise how important Chedzoy would become to me in the future and I finally moved to the village in 2006 where Helen and I have enjoyed a happy retirement in a friendly community.
