Chedzoy's Jubilee Hamper Winner

Chedzoy Parish Council were invited to apply for a Jubilee 22-inch Picnic Hamper, filled with locally sourced products and produce from local suppliers

The hamper was donated by [National Grid's Hinkley Connection Project](#), free of charge, as a thank you to communities for their patience during the work to connect six million homes and businesses to low carbon energy.

It was thought that the fairest way was to put all the residential addresses in the Parish of Chedzoy into a draw and the winning ticket was drawn at the Jubilee Celebrations by the Chair of Chedzoy Parish Council, Marion Dethier.

The lucky recipients, Adam and Hollie Jakins, together with their children Louie and Fern, are pictured below, together with Marion Dethier, who made the presentation.

Adam, who is an Engineer and Hollie, who is a Zookeeper have lived in Chedzoy for 8 years. Originally from Plymouth, they were looking for somewhere halfway between Plymouth and Bristol and chose Chedzoy. They say they were attracted by how pretty the village was and the people. Adam's reaction on hearing he had won? "Ecstatic!!"

There is so much going on at the playing field, and it's looking amazing if you haven't ventured down there in the last little while, I would encourage you all to go and have a look.

As part of the Chedzoy Fair Share Scheme, we have been very busy adding new and exciting elements to the Playing Field. These include some lovely trees next to the bike track, under which we have placed a new bench which was kindly donated by the Chedzoy Pre-school – a massive thank you to all of the staff and trustees who looked after our children so well, and for the donation of the bench with a plaque to commemorate the place many of our children spent their preschool years!

During March we planted a woodland area next to the Willow Hut which one lovely little lady called it a tree castle, isn't that a wonderful description! We hope to plant some bulbs under the trees as they grow. We've also placed black matting on the inside of the bike track to kill the grass and we will be planting perennial flowers in there which will not only help our pollinators and look gorgeous, but also limit the amount of difficult mowing!

The remaining 400 trees from the Queen's Jubilee Green Canopy Fund grant are growing well – big thanks to Steph for applying for the grant and organising all this work. These trees have been used to create a sustainable hedge along the back of the field (furthest from the gate). Besides the great environmental impact, it is also creating a sustainable solution to the fencing which would otherwise have become a problem before long. Huge thanks to all the wonderful volunteers who came along to help us plant! See if you can spot all 18 bird houses painted at the Chedzoy Fair Share open day, dotted around the perimeter of the field.

At the end of March we had our "postponed due to covid" Burns Night Supper which was a wonderful success, this is usually our biggest fundraiser, and although we had to keep numbers lower this year, we raised a good amount of much needed cash after 2 years without any fundraising! We hope you all had a wonderful night if you were able to join us - we have booked in for next January, details to follow closer to the time.

At the end of May we supplied the village garage sale punters with bacon rolls, cake and drinks, and sold out in record time! We made over 200 bacon rolls and sold what felt like a tonne of cake! It was certainly a massive success and together with the donation from the organising committee we managed to raise over £400 – many thanks to the committee for the donation and to you all for popping along and being patient in the long queue!

And finally, a wonderful bbq to open the Queen's Jubilee Celebration Weekend at the beginning of June was another fantastically well supported event! Thank you to the village hall committee for the support and to all of you for coming along for a bite to eat.

It's already been such a great start to the year at the Playing Field, and we will hopefully be able to save enough money to replace the fence on the right-hand side of the field soon – please keep an eye on the Chedzoy Villagers Facebook Page for notice of future events.

Let's Climb Yr Wyddfa by John Paige

Part 3 – It's Nice When it Stops!

We (you, dear reader, and me) have just “summited” Yr Wyddfa (Mount Snowdon), Wales’s highest mountain, in “gopping” weather and we’re now heading back down. We’ve dropped over the ridge just below the summit and are now out of the ferocious wind in the lee on the inside of the Snowdon horseshoe. We’re heading down the steep drop to join the Miners’ Track. Once again, it is not a “technical” walk, just very steep and you can expect to be suffering from “disco legs” (when your leg muscles shake with each step downwards) in an hour or so as muscle fatigue sets in.

The weather has picked up: it's breezy and there are plenty of clouds blowing through, but rain and hail are now infrequent and there are even occasional sunny spells. To be honest, having made it to the summit, the first bit of descent is a bit of a formality but as we turn off onto Miners the challenge goes up a notch. Descending always feels more technically difficult because when you have as much inertial mass as me then a slip and fall is generally more painful (Newton’s second law: Force = mass x acceleration and there’s plenty of mass!). After the drop onto Miners, it’s a steep and downward scramble. We need at least 3 points of contact [hands and feet] on the rocks at all times and sometimes we climb down backwards for safety) but after another hour or so we are just above the northern edge of the higher lake where the water is beautifully clear (and doubtless cold). Now it’s a steady long walk downhill back (about 3 miles) along the shores of the 2 lakes, Glaslyn and the larger Llyn (lake) Llydaw, to Pen-y-Pass and then another mile down to the Cromlech Boulders where the motorbike is parked up. No matter, the weather is now quite pleasant, the scenery is outstanding, and I can hear the pub calling.

Back at the motorbike, we’re going to take a different route home to the Air B&B; it’s one of my favourites ever and you’re gonna love it. From the Boulders, it’s back up the Llanberis Pass, over Pen-y-Pass once more and onto the second half of the beautiful Beddgelert to Capel Curig road (if you want to read a devastatingly moving story, then google “the story Beddgelert”, and read about the legend of a dog called Gelert). Now left onto the A5, passed mountains called Tryfan (my favourite Welsh Mountain) and “the Glyders” (Glyder Fawr and Glyder Fach), passed Llyn Ogwen and down into the Ogwen valley. This bit of the road runs high on the side of the valley with the valley falling steeply hundreds of feet down to our left. It is well known for being able to look down on the RAF’s fast jets flying low level below you as they whiz up the valley.

I’ve done it several times both in Hawk and Jaguar aircraft – it’s a hoot! But today, we’re going in the opposite direction on 2 wheels and it’s gonna be GREAT! Having walked up and down Mount Snowdon we’re feeling heroic, we’re heading down the Ogwen Valley on a 1300cc 150HP V4 Honda motorbike, the road is very wiggly, the scenery is outrageous, there’s almost no traffic and the Pub’s already open; we’re off!

A massive handful of throttle and the bike explodes into action; it’s all happening very fast now. Big bend ahead, hard on the brakes and the front forks bottom out, throw the bike down to the left, into the corner, looking for the exit, on with the power, upright, launch into the next corner, brake, throw the bike down to the right, into the corner, and repeat for the next 3 miles – ON TOP OF THE WORLD!! Just before entering Bethesda, as the 40 MPH sign approaches, flip back into “sensible mode” and potter back to the Air B&B at Penmaenmawr; what a day - and it’s not over yet! Park the bike, dump the kit and it’s a five-minute walk to the pub for a very well earned pie and a pint. Tomorrow, I’m off to Conwy Castle, the RSPB reserve and perhaps Zip World Velocity 2 - The Fastest Zip Line in the World; but that’s another story.

CHEDZOY LANE CYCLE PATH EXTENSION

AT THE JUNCTION OF CHEDZOY LANE AND A39

THE EXISTING CYCLE LANE on the south side of Bath Road M5 bridge is accessed from Chedzoy Lane **via** the A39. This dangerous manoeuvre requires cyclists to join fast moving traffic. Having to stop on the steep slope before the apex of the incline means loss of momentum which is not ideal and can be dangerous.

THE ROAD SAFETY ISSUE. On 7 April 2021 a cyclist was killed by a speeding car at this site. Somerset County Council's works programme is based on collision and traffic data which prioritises road safety and congestion issues. The **PROPOSAL** fits these criteria.

We cannot escape the dreadful scenes that continue to fill the news reports. In Chedzoy, residents, their families, friends and the whole community have been incredibly generous in support for the Ukrainian Refugee crisis through a series of events, co-ordinated by Amanda Triggol.

Boxes and bags filled the Village Hall in response to an appeal for basic goods in early March. The monthly Coffee Shop became the drop-off opportunity for essentials that had been requested through a contact at St Mary's Church, Bridgwater. Very soon Amanda was working hard at packing and sorting donations coming in from all over Bridgwater. The need for funding became the focus as all of the aid had to be delivered to the Poland-Ukraine border. Chedzoy's donation of £1,500 from profits of the monthly POP IN Bar nights and Coffee Mornings funded the cost of the articulated lorry and driver. The cheque was presented by Martin Chandler (Chairman of Chedzoy Village Hall), Laura Chandler and Amanda.

A further fantastic fundraising event – The Ukraine Lunch - raised a final total of £1,125 for the Disasters Emergency Committee Appeal. It wouldn't be accurate to call it a Soup Kitchen as it was far more than that; waitress service from an extensive menu of homemade soups with plenty of cheese and biscuits, Raffle, and Sunflower themed crafts sale, with all proceeds going to the appeal! Wyke Dairy gave a hamper of goods for auction and supplied cheese free of charge.

Amanda said she was absolutely amazed by the generosity of Chedzoy residents and friends and thanked all the team for all donations and help.

A Day to Remember – 5th June 2022 – The Queens Pageant by Andrew & Cheryl HarveySn

Our Carnival Club (WILFS CC) were asked to walk in front of the Bridgwater Carnival Pageant Cart in London for the Queen's Pageant on Sunday 5th June 2022. We were asked because we are Bridgwater's oldest walking club and it was felt we would be an asset to the front of the 300ft entry that Bridgwater was producing (100ft cart and 110 dancers). Bridgwater Carnival was approached by the London Pageant Team to represent the Somerset Carnivals in the Pageant.

Discussions were held as to what theme we could portray and after discussions between Bridgwater's Pageant Team and club members it was decided that we should portray a street party to honour the Queen. Ideas were thrown in the pot and our club member and one of our seamstresses Nicki came up with the idea that we could be tables, displaying party food accompanied by chefs. Costumes were designed and members set to work making cakes, sandwiches etc for decorating the tables. All of the food was made from an assortment of lightweight materials, cakes were knitted or made with expanding foam, camping mats were moulded and decorated for the bigger cakes, packing peanuts painted with makeup and used for sausages and polystyrene used for the sandwiches. The table was lightweight as it was a piece of Cellulux which gave the table effect once covered with our costume. It was a wonderful team effort by everyone which showed on the day. Movement rehearsals with and without the tables were held on a number of occasions, although we could not dance all the routine the same as the cart and the dance performer due to our tables but we did manage to incorporate one part of the routine which meant that everyone on the cart, the dancers and us were all doing the same movements. Nicki who designed the costume assisted by Rae ensured that each costume fitted perfectly, consisting of red/white and blue/white gingham dresses, bloomers, stripy socks and finished off with a cake orientated head band, the table had an elasticated waist that was tightened so the table didn't fall down, also straps to the apron help keep it balanced.

So an early start on Sunday 5th June, whilst others were sleeping off the after effects of the night before we met the coach at 5.30am, with butterflies in tummy's wondering what the day would bring and full of excitement to be part of this historical and once in a lifetime event we headed off for London. By 10am we were in London, passed security and headed to our changing area in Horse Guards Parade. By 1pm we were dressed and lined up ready to go, although we didn't leave Horse Guards Parade until about 2.45pm we had to be lined up for security reasons and took in the preparations that were happening around us. The old bikes, the old cars, the buses, Daleks (all of whom you saw on TV) were in the same station as us along with many celebrities. Then off we went, us, the dancers and finally the special built amazing cart. We pa

At the inaugural meeting of the new Parish Council, Marion Dethier was elected Chair, with Simon Howes being Vice Chair. The other Councillors are Mary Clothier, Brian Gale, Russell Harmes ,Karen Medland and Rodney Young.

Jubilee Celebrations – Every household in the Parish of Chedzoy should have had a Jubilee mug that was partly funded by Chedzoy Parish Council. The beacon for the event was purchased by the Parish Council at a cost of £490 (plus VAT) and will be situated in the Bus Shelter Garden, together with a suitable plaque.

Fairshare Scheme – The capital investment was now coming to an end and the maintenance would rest with the Parish Council.

Mobile Library Service – Does not cover Chedzoy as we are less than 3 miles (as the crow flies) from the Library building in Bridgwater.

Somerset Waste Partnership – Has a new “Fixy” van that is being introduced in the County to promote the repair and re-use of electrical and electronic items.
