

Walter Raleigh – Some Authentication - by John Paige

Dear Readers, you may have read the piece I wrote for the last edition of the Chedzoy Clarion, about Walter Raleigh, who lived in my house, Crosstree House, here in Chedzoy. Walter was murdered by David Barrett on 10 October 1646 and was buried in the Quire (or Choir) of Wells Cathedral in front of the Dean's Stall; no inscription marks his grave.

Whilst this is true, a recent visit to the Cathedral revealed that as you pass through the entrance to the Quire, on the right-hand side just past the door to



the organ loft, there is a plaque. The inscription reads: **Walter Raleigh, Dean of Wells 1642 – 1646, a nephew of the famous Sir Walter. He was murdered in the Deanery, where he was imprisoned as a Royalist, by his gaoler, David Barrett, a shoemaker and buried under the Dean's stall by Mr Standish, a Priest Vicar, who was accordingly put in prison where he died.** See, I wasn't just making it all up!

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
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Spring Chicken Bake *by Amy Kimber*

Healthy, easy and quick to tidy up



- 1 tbsp Olive Oil
- 1 tbsp Tomato Puree
- 1 Garlic Clove, crushed
- 400g Chopped Tomatoes
- 1 Onion, chopped
- 1 Pepper (Red or Yellow), chopped into chunks
- 1 Courgette, sliced
- 500g Chicken Thighs
- 1 tsp dried Rosemary
- 400g Butter Beans

Serves 4

Preheat the oven to 190 C. Heat the oil in a large roasting tin on the hob.

Season the chicken thighs and add to the tin, frying for 5 minutes or until browned all over. Remove and put to one side.

Add the onions, garlic, courgette and pepper to the tray and cook for 3-4 minutes turning until softened.

Stir in the tomatoes, puree, rosemary and simmer for a minute or two.

Then add the chicken and butter beans and put in the oven for 25 minutes

Ginger and Lime Cheesecake *by Amy Kimber*

This is a family favourite, sharp flavours, easy to make and really delicious.

200g Gingernut biscuits, crushed

50g Butter, melted

500g Mascarpone Cheese

40g Icing sugar, sifted

Finely grated zest and juice of 2 Limes

Chocolate decorations pre-bought or handmade

Extra Lime slices, sugared to decorate

Serves 8

Mix together the biscuits and butter and press into the base of a 18cm spring form or loose bottomed cake tin. Then leave to chill in the fridge for 30mins.

Meanwhile beat the mascarpone cheese, icing sugar, lime zest and juice together and spread it over the biscuit base. Chill for 30 minutes.

Carefully remove the cheesecake from the tin and decorate with chocolate, limes or something else you might like to use.

Melt some chocolate and have fun making swirls on baking paper to chill and decorate the cheesecake once hardened.

Snippets from the Minutes

Below are a few items from the Chedzoy Parish Council Minutes. The full story can be found at www.chedzoyparishcouncil.gov.uk, as well as other interesting items such as footpaths and CCCP (Chedzoy Climate Change Project)

CCCP

It was hoped that a further tree planting session on the 3rd December would mean that an additional 500 trees would be planted, bringing the total to over 2000 trees.

Speeding Cars

The Police were agreeable to do a survey of how many cars are speeding through the village. The results could lead to the formation of a volunteer Chedzoy Speed Watch Team.

Village Design Statement

The Parish Council is very keen to produce a Village Design Statement in an effort, amongst other things, to have some say in future planning matters.

SCC Overspend

Councillor Rodrigues reported that there is a projected overspend of £22 million on the Somerset County Council Budget, the biggest expense being in adult & children's social care.

Refugees

There was an hotel on the outskirts of Bridgwater housing some 324 single male Albanian refugees.

NHS Problems & Delays

It was felt that there should be some training available to Parishioners relating to First Aid, Defibrillator Use and First Response Activities.

Precept

The Precept was left to the December meeting as it was felt prudent that the Parish should be "financially resilient" in case it has to take over any services from Somerset County Council. All this is conjecture as no decisions have been made public yet.

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Village Design Statement

The Parish Council is keen to hear the views of it's parishioners as to what direction people would like Chedzoy to go in the future. How many more new houses? Should there be an Industrial Estate within the village? What materials and colours for new builds, would people prefer. More Car Parking for residents and visitors. Better bus service? More easily accessible footpaths? In fact anything at all relating to the environment you live in. Without a Village Design Statement (created with your help), influencing any future planning may become more difficult. If the Parish Council can set out their vision on behalf of YOU to try and guide the Planners, the better it will be for the community.

Please give your thoughts and ideas to any Parish Councillor. Please get involved.

Music on the Levels

Music on the Levels announces the programme of concerts for 2023, starting on Sunday 29 January with Sunset Café Stompers, a six-piece band playing music from the New Orleans dance halls of a century ago, and finishing on 26 November when Wallscourt Brass presents seasonal music from composers ancient and modern, resounding in the fine acoustics of the beautiful parish church of St Mary, Westonzoyland.

Between the two, there's a variety of styles and moods, ranging from the reinterpretation of popular songs by Leeds Conservatoire students, Devon Salinas and Sophie Green, a musical menagerie from Trio Paradis, the rousing Ciderhouse Rebellion, massed brass and woodwind from The Kingsbury Band, songs of love and lust from Daisy Chapman and Sue Lord, a more romantic take with Tell Me The Trust About Love with Niall Hoskin Jacquelyn Bevan, and Ali and the Swing Cats re-living the smooth swing and gypsy jazz of the 20th century.

The concerts are held in Westonzoyland's parish church of St Mary the Virgin on Main Road, Westonzoyland, TA7 0EP.

All concerts start at 3 pm. Tea, coffee and cake are available at a modest charge from 2.15 pm.

Committee member, Frank Challenger, comments:

'As there are currently no statutory requirements with regard to Covid and we are being a little more relaxed about numbers.

' However, Music on the Levels has an informal booking system to help provide a comfortable and enjoyable experience for everyone and give an indication of how many cakes to bake! However, if you have not booked by the time of the concert, there may still be room for you.

' We are retaining the principal of free entry to our concerts as we want to include as many people as possible.

'Of course, there is a cost to us! So in order to help with the artists' fees and other expenses such as heating, we sell refreshments and a raffle is held. In addition donations are encouraged from those who can afford to contribute.'

Sunday March 26-Trio Paradis

Jacquelyn Bevan - piano, Lisa Betteridge - violin and Linda Stocks – cello, present a musical menagerie: cats, dogs, birds, fish ... and an elephant, including numbers from Saint-Saëns' Carnival of the Animals and well-known songs from Disney films. ST MARY'S CHURCH CHEDZOY *By Carole Edmunds*

At the time of writing it is the eve of a highlight of the Chedzoy Church calendar. Our beautiful church will be lit by over 150 candles and carols will be sung in the traditional pre-Christmas service of Lessons and Carols for the first time in three years. Twelve months ago the planned service could not go ahead because of the Omicron wave of Covid; the electrics in the building had not passed the safety inspection; there were almost no working lights in the nave and within two months the parish would have no vicar; all in all not a good position to be in.

As many of you are aware, Revd. Dr Jane Sutton (pictured below) who has known us since her training days in our joint benefice with Westonzoyland, has been appointed as our new incumbent and will shortly be installed in a special licencing service in Westonzoyland Church in January. The Bishop of Bath and Wells, Rt. Rev. Michael Beasley will be joining us for this. Revd. Jane's appointment means we will stay as a benefice of just two parishes, just as we are at present.

October and November marked Harvest Thanksgiving, All Souls and Remembrance Sunday – three special services that have been led by and given a personal touch by Jane. And now we look forward to Christmas!

As for the lighting, the safety test was passed and thanks to a donation from POP IN, we now have functional and hopefully long lasting LED bulbs. The rising costs of insuring, securing and maintaining the building and church yard have and will continue to challenge. It feels like we are running to stand still but with such good community support our essential costs have been met in 2022. The Harvest events have traditionally been the mainstay of Church fundraising and happily made a return this year. The Whist Drives, Garage Sale, Race Night and Christmas Fair and some grant success have made a big difference too when compared to the Pandemic years, when bills kept coming but with little income to pay them from.

There will be Lent Lunches and the Toy Sale in the Spring and 2023 will begin with a new name on the board in church.



Children's Hospice South West goes to Glastonbury Festival *(by Kerry Evert on behalf of Liz Rhodes)*

In 2007, Liz and a group of volunteers started raising money for charity through Glastonbury Festival. Their job is to look after the Dairy Ground campsite at pedestrian gate D. Liz took over as supervisor of the group in 2014, and I joined her in 2022 for the first time. It was such an incredible experience, helping festival goers find their way to gigs and find their tents in the dark. We handed out litter and recycling bags, made sure people were safe, helped some young people with collapsing tents at night and some of the crew even had to help with security this year at a few overcrowded gigs. When Liz first told us about it, she said that we're basically there to be a friendly face, and that was very much what I experienced.

In 2016, a little boy close to most of the crew who had been working together for 10 years, sadly died at Charlton Farm, the first of 3 Children's Hospice South West locations near Bristol. Because of this traumatic experience, the group led by Liz decided to switch charities to instead donate in his name to Children's Hospice South West. Since then, the group has raised **£15,825** for this incredible charity, adding £7,400 to the total this year!!

Many people will think of a hospice as a sad place, but I can tell you that although their main business will always be caring for children in the final days of their life, the hospice is such a magically happy place. They offer respite care for families with children with life limiting illnesses, where they focus on the whole family, and their sibling support is extraordinary. Siblings of children with life limiting illnesses are often left out, because families have to put so much time and energy into the care of the sick child, and siblings feel that they take second place. So the sibling support on offer is so extremely important.

Even years after a child has died, families are invited back to remembrance events. As an example, they run an event every year around Christmas - which can be a very difficult time - where bereaved families together decorate the Christmas trees dotted around the buildings at Charlton Farm. This event allows newly-bereaved parents to feel supported by those who are further along in their journey.

Over the past near 3 years, things have been incredibly difficult for all charities. During a recent visit to Charlton Farm, some of the staff were telling me how much they were struggling. Because instead of being able to offer the respite care they normally do for families, they have had to go out to people's homes for visits. This has meant that siblings and extended families have not had the incredible support they previously had. Especially at a time when families will have been under so much more pressure than normal, due to many of the children with life limiting illnesses also being extremely vulnerable.

So, I know that this money donated by Glastonbury Festival through Liz's group this past year will have been so well used to support families with children with life-limiting illnesses.

We had some great fundraising opportunities over the autumn. Starting with food at the enormously fun race night, thank you to all who joined us for dinner or a takeaway. Followed by our Halloween pop up pit stop, the weather couldn't have been more different to last year. It absolutely poured, but that didn't stop the lovely children of Chedzoy and their parents, there were some very full sweet buckets!

All of these events help us put money towards repairing the fence on the left-hand side of the field. The 75m stretch will cost us almost £6,000 to replace, which is several years' worth of fundraising!! With the cost of material having skyrocketed over the past year, we're trying desperately to get a grant to help us pay for the fence which is getting dangerous with many of the old wooden posts having rotted off at the ground... keep an eye on the village Facebook page for notice of further fundraising activities.

12 days of Christmas Running by Kerry Evert

From Christmas Eve (starting with the Chedzoy Running Club Christmas Eve Advent Window Run), I will be running 10km (6.2 miles in old money) for 12 days in a row – that is the further than running from Chedzoy to Cardiff. I am doing this to support the Bridgwater Food Bank. You will have seen & heard on the news about the number of people requiring support from foodbanks, in Bridgwater alone, the following stats are true:



This year, from April to September, 1.3 million emergency food parcels were distributed to families in need in the UK, this is an increase of 52% compared with the same period in 2019.

At Christmas time, which is a time of such excess for many of us, people are very generous, and foodbanks are very grateful to receive these donations, you will have seen from Malcolm's posts on the Chedzoy Villagers Page on Facebook, that during 2022, we donated 702 items, weighing 304kgs! And that brings our total since 2015 to 1.3 metric tonnes.

People access foodbanks through referrals from doctors, schools, citizens advice, job centres and many other professionals. Vouchers can be given to families which can be exchanged for a food parcel with 3 – 7 days of food for a household. Non food items such as toiletries are often also included.

I recently read a story which really touched my heart, where a family had received some fancy M&S biscuits, and the mother was in floods of tears at the foodbank and said to the volunteers that she couldn't believe that someone out there thought she was worthy of receiving such special biscuits. This was a single mother, who worked full time and was having to rely on foodbanks to feed her 2 children as her income wasn't enough.

This made me feel so sad that there are people in our own community who believe that they are not even worthy of a packet of biscuits.

I do hope that you will join me in 2023 donating food items to people in Bridgwater who are less fortunate than ourselves. Pop something special into your trolley next time you're in the shops and drop it off at the Church. If you'd prefer me to collect it, please drop me a message and I would be happy to! Some people have also asked about donating cash, I am going to set up a page which I will post on Facebook. Otherwise, if you wanted to drop cash off at my house, I will buy some tinned meat and fish and vegetables with it and take the whole lot to the foodbank in one go.

I think January is a particularly hard month for people, and it would be great if we could spread a little love.

Below is an excerpt from Somerset Bus Partnership

“Bus services across Somerset are under threat because the Government’s Bus Recovery Grant is set to end next March.

The growth in working from home and continuing nervousness about Covid, particularly amongst older bus users, has resulted in bus passenger numbers at 30 - 25% below pre Covid levels. The withdrawal of Government funding will make many bus services no longer commercially viable.

Nor will the new Somerset Unitary Council be in a position to step in and provide extra support for bus services, they may even be forced to scale back their support for buses as the costs of all the statutory services Somerset is obliged to support are soaring due to the current high rates of inflation that will only get even worse next year.

Yet the cost of living crisis will mean buses will become an even more vital form of transport than ever. Plus there is climate change that means we should all be reducing our dependence on the car ... but to be able to do that we need to have the option of going by bus.”

Basically they are looking for a Bus Champion from each Parish to promote their cause. Has Chedzoy anyone keen enough to be our Champion? Please let me know and I will forward your name on.
